As the children return to school let me introduce you to Kate Blackburn the **Youth Project Co-ordinator**. Kate works out of Bridgwater Police Centre but covers the whole of Somerset working with schools, community groups, statutory and voluntary agencies promoting the youth agenda, a partnership approach to reducing youth crime, and being actively involved in problem solving initiatives in relation to young people.

This year has already seen Kate giving advice to young people about 'getting naked online' and the risks of child sexual exploitation, as well as providing support to your local PCSO's to deliver Road Safety lessons to children in primary education.

On 30th November Somerset Policing area will host a Children's Takeover day. We will open our doors to 20 children aged between 11 and 14yrs who will have the opportunity to demonstrate their problem solving skills. We hope to understand how children use social media and why they are becoming victims of cyber-crime at such a young age. Their task will involve presenting their findings to Senior Police Leaders and our team of staff will use the information we gain from this to inform our engagement with young people as they become the citizens of our future.

SEASONAL CRIME REDUCTION

(advice from our Crime Reduction Officer)

With the evenings starting to draw in, it is perhaps time to check your house security. Leaving lights on timers can give 'illusion of occupancy' - you can even buy a timer device that makes it look as if you are at home watching the TV. This is particularly useful when you are going out during the evening taking part in hobbies, going to the theatre, watching Carnivals across the county, going on holiday etc.

Think also about external 'dusk til dawn' lighting – modern LED lights are very cheap to run and will only cost about 1p to have on during the hours of darkness.

For those in the rural community you may also be topping up your oil tanks in readiness for the winter. Criminals take advantage of this and we often see a rise in heating oil thefts during the autumn. Consider adding an approved padlock to the tank or perhaps a tank alarm which can be linked to your domestic system or can even send a message to your smartphone'.
